




















New Zealand – Some Facts

- Population 5.1 million
 [ranked 126th similar to Ireland]
- Area 270,500 square kilometres [76th - larger than United Kingdom 242,900]
- Nominal GDP per capita \$43,400 [20th on par with Canada, Germany, Belgium]

Malignant primary brain tumours


- 337 cases (all ages, annually)
- 278 deaths (all ages, annually)

Childhood brain tumours

- 36 cases (aged 0–14 years, annually)
- 9 deaths (aged 0–14 years, annually)



Childhood cancer deaths in New Zealand




- I Leukaemias, myeloproliferative diseases, and myelodysplastic diseases (22%)
- II Lymphomas and reticuloendothelial neoplasms (5%)
- III CNS and miscellaneous intracranial and intraspinal neoplasms (42%)
- IV Neuroblastoma and other peripheral nervous cell tumours (9%)
- V Retinoblastoma (0%)
- VI Renal tumours (2%)
- VII Hepatic tumours (3%)
- VIII Malignant bone tumours (7%)
- IX Soft tissue and other extraosseous sarcomas (9%)
- X Germ cell tumours, trophoblastic tumours, and neoplasms of gonads (0%)
- XI Other malignant epithelial neoplasms and malignant melanomas (2%)
- XII Other and unspecified malignant neoplasms (0%)


- III.a Ependymomas and choroid plexus tumours (3%)




- Formed as a charitable trust in June 2019

Lessons learned


- Do your research
